The Uighurs are among the earliest of the Turkic peoples. Tribes known by the name Uighur (Huihe in the very extensive Chinese sources) appear as subjects of the enormous nomadic Türk empire, which, with variations in the extent of actual power over time, ruled most of northeastern Central Asia, as far west as the Aral Sea, from 582 to 744. The Uighurs conquered the Türks and set up their own empire in 744, with its capital in Karabalgasun on the High Orkhon River in today's Mongolia. A major event of this period was Böğü Kaghan conversion to Manichaeism in 762 or 763 and his official adoption of this faith as the Uighur state religion. Chinese sources report that in 789 the kaghan requested his people be renamed Huihu in Chinese.

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
